ABOUTIBU

International Business University started with the vision to establish an independent teaching-oriented and student-centered university in Canada.

In 2015, a founding group of academics and businesspeople came together to make this vision a reality. Right from the start, the intent was to establish a university specializing in business education with a global perspective encompassing businesses in Canada and around the world.

After extensive consultations with educational experts and business representatives, the group prepared innovative proposals to establish the university and its inaugural degree in 2019. Ontario's Postsecondary Education Quality Assessment Board (PEQAB) considered the group's proposals in June 2020, approving the application for a university title and the first of its programs.

Ontario's Minister of Colleges and Universities granted final consent on December 4, 2020, making IBU the first homegrown independent university ever to be established in the province. IBU announced in March 2O23 that it met all of Ontario's International Student Program (ISP) requirements to be recognized and approved as a Designated Learning Institution (DLI) by the Canadian Government (DLI# O282326631372).

IBU is Toronto's first independent, not-for-profit university to provide this opportunity to international students. DLI accreditation is awarded to educational institutions that meet the strict requirements of ISP regulations for granting a study permit. This reflects the university's commitment to providing international students with a world-class education and workforce development opportunities.

Achieving DLI accreditation is an important milestone for IBU because it opens new opportunities for international students who want to study and work in Canada. It also allows international students to gain valuable work experience in the country, enhancing their career prospects, and enabling them to contribute to a highly skilled and diverse workforce in Canada.

In April 2023, IBU receives the approval of the MBA Program in Technology, Innovation, and Entrepreneurship. Endorsed and supported by IBU's Board of Governors and Program Advisory Council the MBA will focus on the context of business, trends shaping the environment, the conceptualization of research problems, effective communication, solution formulation, legal and ethical considerations, and understanding a complex business environment.

We believe that each student at IBU will become a success story in their own right.



SCOPE OF THE HANDBOOK

CANADA

Canada became a country in 1867 when three British colonies—Canada, New Brunswick, and Nova Scotia— joined together as the Dominion of Canada. Today Canada is an independent nation with 10 provinces and 3 territories.

Canada is a constitutional monarchy and member of the British Commonwealth. Canada has three levels of government: federal, provincial/territorial and municipal or regional.



Ontario is part of central Canada and the largest province by population with more than one third of Canada's population. Ontario is the fourth largest province by size, but it is still very large-twice the size of France and nearly one third of the size of India. The province stretches from the Ottawa River valley in the east, the edge of the prairies in the west, the Great Lakes in the south, and Hudson's Bay in the north. Most Ontarians live in urban centers near the Great Lakes and the St. Lawrence River. Ottawa, the capital city of Canada, is on the Ottawa River. Toronto is Canada's largest city, and the fourth largest in North America-6 million people live in the Greater Toronto Area (GTA).



LIFE IN CANADA

LIVING IN ONTARIO

Ontario is a large province with many cultures and traditions. Every community in Ontario is unique, from big cities to small towns, but this guide will give you a brief introduction to life in the province.

CLIMATE

Ontario has four distinct seasons with cold winters and warm summers, but the weather varies from location to location. Ontario's climate is influenced by the Great Lakes, which make the weather unpredictable and quick changing. Ontarians must check the weather forecast every day to make sure they are prepared!

WINTER

Winter begins around October in Northern Ontario and late November or December in Southern Ontario. It lasts until March in the south and April in the north. Temperatures can drop far below freezing and snow sometimes accumulates into large snow banks. When the temperature goes up, the streets become full of slush. However, life in Canada does not stop in winter. Ontarians put on their winter boots, warm coats, hats, gloves and scarves and go about their day.

SUMMER

June to August are the summer months. Summers in Ontario can sometimes be hot and humid, especially in larger cities. However, the daily temperature can change from quite cool in the mornings to very hot in the afternoon.

SPRING

Spring is often very rainy and lasts from March to June—but can feel much shorter. Sometimes there is winter weather in late March and summer conditions in late May. In fact, in the spring, weather can change from summer conditions one day to winter conditions the next.

FALL

Fall brings cooler temperatures, lots of wind and both rainy and sunny days. Fall is also the beginning of the new school year and the harvest season. Leaves change colour to orange and red before falling from the trees—which is how the season gets its name.



Ontario is home to many historic sites and cultural attractions. From Niagara Falls to Fort York to Parliament Hill, you can learn about Ontario's history and culture wherever you live. Many museums, galleries, parades, celebrations and festivals, both large and small, are free of charge or may have a small fee. Some sites and events have discounts for children, youth, students and seniors. Some events, such as New Year's Eve fireworks, Maple Syrup festivals, Doors Open tours, Gay Pride parades, Canada Day celebrations, and Santa Claus parades occur all over the province, but some special events are unique to their community.

COMMUNITY CENTRES AND RECREATION:

Cities and towns in Ontario have many social and recreational opportunities. Most communities have a place where community groups can meet. Many community centers also have skating arenas, swimming pools, gyms and sports fields. Some facilities and programs can be used for free while others have fees or require registration. Some programs are open to everyone, and other programs require advanced registration.



Before you arrive

Keep track of everything you'll need to do as you prepare to attend International Business University.

- Gather immigration documents Be aware of which immigration documents are required to study in Canada and apply for them at least four months prior to arriving;
- You may require both a Study Permit and an entrance document (visa or eTA) - Applications can be made via canada.ca;
- Make travel arrangements. If your immigration document hasn't been processed, make sure to keep your travel plans flexible;
- You shouldn't travel to Canada unless your immigration document application has been approved;
- Register for student orientation. This event will help you get acquainted with IBU;
- Get Canadian currency. This will allow you to cover your initial expenses upon arrival;
- Health care coverage: Make sure you have health insurance before you start university.



Arriving in Canada

Toronto Pearson International Airport is the nearest international airport to the city of Toronto.

Upon entry into Canada, a Canadian Customs Officer will question your purpose of entre and check your immigration documents. Respond to any questions you are asked both simply and truthfully. Service will be available in English and French. If you do not understand, ask if an interpreter is available in other languages.

Be sure to carry the following documents in your hand luggage, as you will require them at the Canadian Immigration post:

- 1. Passport
- 2. Study Permit (if required)
- 3. Proof of acceptance from International Business University
- 4. Proof of funds available for support (e.g. GIC, bank statement, traveler's cheques)
- 5. Proof of Covid vaccination (optional)

It is strongly advised that you carry photocopies of all your official documents in a place separate from the originals. Also, we suggest to leave copies of your documents with family members at home and email some photocopies to yourself.

TRANSITION

Transitioning to university, a new country, culture, social, linguistic and academic environment can be very demanding. And we know that.

Stage One: "Honeymoon Phase" When you first enter a new culture everything is new and exciting. You may feel happy and excited about your new surroundings.

Stage Two: "Culture Shock" Culture shock is the emotional and/or physical discomfort experienced when settling into a new culture. While for some people the process may be brief and hardly noticeable, for others it may be associated with disorientation, stress, confusion, a desire to remain withdrawn, loneliness, anger, frustration, fear, homesickness or depression. Some may experience physical problems (fatigue, illness, upset stomach, insomnia, headaches, etc.).

Stage Three: "Cultural Adaptation" During this stage you begin to accept your new surroundings and start to feel more comfortable. You start participating in the local culture, learning the language, making friends and enjoying life.

COPING WITH TRANSITION

General Practices:

- Establish a routine and manage your time.
- Keep in contact with home.
- Evaluate your expectations and be flexible.
- Pay attention to what your body is telling you.
- Keep an open mind.
- Talk to people, join a club and make friends.
- Keep your sense of humor and try to enjoy yourself.


Empowering the Next Generation of Leaders:

STUDYING AT IBU

2.1 Timetables

Class schedules are posted at least two weeks before the first day of the term. Classes are scheduled between the hours of 8:00 am and 9:00pm, Monday to Saturday. 2.2 Academics Progress Reports

Each student receives an up-to-date grade in each course in which they are registered. Grades are posted at regular time intervals. Progress alerts through professors and student services can identify various areas of risk, which include poor attendance, participation, poor grades, frequent lateness, and time management. 2.5 Semester Break

2.6 Academic Integrity

Academic honesty is a guiding principle within IBU for students, faculty members, and administrative staff. IBU values openness, honesty, civility, and curiosity in all academic endeavors. All members of the IBU community are obligated to maintain the highest standards of academic honesty, to follow accepted standards of academic honesty, and to foster these practices in others. 2.7 Examinations

Your instructor will provide the date and time of the final examination in course. Final examinations are normally scheduled during your timetabled class time, usually in the last week of the term. Variations may occur depending on the term.

2.8 Grading

All students in all courses will be evaluated according to the 4.3 GPA grading scale.

To ensure that grades and GPAs remain consistent on transcripts, all students will have their final grade aligned to the grading scales in place when they started their studies as per the grading policy and equivalency tables in the Academic Calendar, Re: Policy 103.

2.9 Residency Requirements

STUDENT SUPPORT SERVICES

Students at International Business University have access to a wide variety of services to support their university journey for a successful program completion.

There is no additional fee being charged for any of these services.

3.1 Academic Advising & Mentoring

Each student is provided with an academic advisor who is knowledgeable about the program in which the student is enrolled. The advisors are one access point for almost any question or problem a student might face. They work like graduation coaches who help the students through every phase of their academic journey.

Academic advisors help students find answers to questions or resolve problems related to a wide range of issues including (but not limited to) registration, program progression, day to day queries, graduation, academic and university regulations and procedures along with any support services.



3.2 Registrar's Office

The Registrar's Office helps and assists students with their progression during their programs along with a wide range of related matters pertaining to scheduling, academic activities, program support and International Student Advising. Any requests for advice or support can be made at any time through e-mail, web-form, or phone numbers.

3.3 Mental Health and Wellness Services

At International Business University we encourage and support our students to complete their programs and fulfill their career objectives.

We enable this through ensuring a consistent approach, to support mental health of our students. 
3.9 Student Health Insurance
